Trail Talk

9th Pumpkinvine Bike Ride Tops 800 Riders Again

The possibility of rain didn't dampen the enthusiasm of 826 participants in the June 21 Pumpkinvine Bike Ride. That number compares to 885 who registered last year. (See photos of the ride on pages 4-5.) The community again showed its support for the ride and the development of the Pumpkinvine Nature Trail.

The feedback we heard most often was that the event was "great," "well organized," and "a lovely event." Many said it was their first ride and that they would come back next year and bring their friends.

The forecast of afternoon rain may have been partly responsible for the reduced number of riders. And it did rain. The worst of it, including extremely strong winds, hit

the 102-milers at the far end of their ride.

At one time we had eight vehicles out looking for bicyclists who needed a ride in. Some bikers used their cell phones and called family members to come and pick them up. Others, troopers and heroes to the end, rode out the storm. There were stories of seeking cover in barns, horse shelters, and garages. True to a bicyclist's motto, tales of woe were overshadowed by beaming heroics of endurance.

Trail to be extended this fall – Phase 5A2 receives \$900,000 grant

A \$900,000 grant from the Indiana Department of Natural Resources, Indiana Trails Grant Fund will surface between two and three miles of the Pumpkinvine Nature Trail on Goshen's northeast side this fall. The exact length of the project depends on how the bids come in, according to Larry Neff, Superintendent of the Elkhart County Park Department.

This grant follows on the heels of a \$250,000 grant to the Elkhart County Park Department from the Indiana Department of Natural Resources to develop the half-mile section of the trail between CR 28 (where the current surfaced trail ends) and CR 127.

The IDNR wants to see more trails in Indiana, Neff said. "They really would like the money to go toward actual "on-the-ground" trails as soon as possible."

Sitescape, Inc., has been hired to work with the Elkhart County Parks as a consultant on this phase, CR 127 to CR 31 or phase 5A2.


The good news is that construction will be done this fall. "We will have bid documents sometime in August with a bid opening at the September 22nd Elkhart County Park Board meeting," Neff said.

"We will need to construct a new bridge over the Hoover Ditch and a small culvert over a Hoover Ditch

lateral," Neff said. "The rest of the trail is basically laying a 10' strip of asphalt."

Neff hopes that the bids will allow them to reach CR 33, but it will depend on the cost of doing CR 127 to CR 31. "We are always optimistic and project reaching the trail end," Neff said. "There is one bridge in this section (CR 31 to CR 33) that will need decking, handrails and some reinforcement in the abutments."

The Friends of the Pumpkinvine Nature Trail, Inc., donated the Pumpkinvine corridor from CR 28 to CR 33 at the May Elkhart County Park Board meeting.



From the president Support of cycling grows as gas prices rise



Supporters of the Friends of the Pumpkinvine Nature Trail have been promoting non-motorized transportation for nearly 20 year. With the average price of a gallon of gas around \$4 a gallon across the country, politicians at all levels are starting to see the wisdom of encouraging cycling and more public transportation.

Take the U.S. Conference of Mayors. They recently adopted a resolution that bicycling should be integrated into the country's transportation, climate, energy and health policy initiatives. The resolution provides solid reasons why cities should support cycling:

- "... bicycle commuters annually save on average \$1,825 in auto-related costs, reduce their carbon emissions by 128 pounds, conserve 145 gallons of gasoline, and avoid 50 hours of gridlock traffic; and . . .
- 10% of global oil production goes solely toward fueling America's cars and trucks, and the U.S. could save 462 millions of gallons of gasoline a year by increasing cycling from 1% to 1.5% of all trips. . . ."

At the state level, Governor Daniels continues to put money behind his enthusiastic endorsement of trails. He has used his influence to see that Elkhart County parks received two grants this spring – one for \$250,000 and another for \$900,000. It's exciting to see those funds putting several sections of the Pumpkinvine in place this summer and fall between CR 28 and CR 33. (We wish he would use his power to make the process for obtaining INDOT enhancement funding for trails was less cumbersome, but that's another matter.)

Locally, Goshen has a new paved a trail on the north side of Plymouth Ave. from CR 19 to CR 21 and is planning a trail along C.R. 21 between Clover Trails subdivision and C.R. 36. Last year the county completed a 4.8-mile bike path along CR 45 from Hively Ave. in Elkhart to the Pickwick Village subdivision – the Goshen City limit. Next year (I'm told) the city of Goshen will finish that bike path into the city and connect it with the Maple City Greenway and the Pumpkinvine.

Finally, area cyclists are organizing to take advantage of the pro-cycling mood. A group of cycling advocates in Goshen is meeting to consider what it would take to earn the designation of Bicycle Friendly Community from the League of American Bicyclists. A group in Nappanee, Michiana Bicycle Safety Awareness, is working with the chamber of commerce, local businesses and MACOG to promote cycling safety. Another group in South Bend has organized the Bike Michiana Coalition to coordinate the activities of all the cycling groups in the area. (See www.BikeMichiana.org.) Ten area cycling groups attended an organizing meeting Aug. 7, 2008.

Will the new interest in non-motorized transportation last once people have adjusted to higher gas prices or do they signal a genuine shift in transportation priorities? We saw similar growth in cycling interest after the earlier spikes in gas prices. I'm hopeful that this time we will have the political will turn a fad into a transportation policy that is not auto-centric.



Stewardship Solutions

Construction on CR28 to CR 127 began the week of Aug. 11

Workers with Niblock Excavating, Bristol, Ind., prepare the Pumpkinvine Nature Trail for final surfacing with asphalt. After the surface has been scrapped and leveled, they apply a layer of # 53 proceed gravel, a mixture of clay and small

stones (Photo1). If the machine misses a spot, they fill it in by hand (Photo 2). Then they check to see if the surface is angled level and correctly. (Photo 3). Finally, they roll and compact the gravel (Photo 4).

Friends receive grant for fencing from CIBA

In January, the Friends of the Pumpkinvine Nature Trail, Inc., received a \$1,873 grant from the CIBA Foundation of Indianapolis to pay for fencing and gates between CR 26 and CR 33. The foundation is a charitable organization formed and supported by the Central Indiana Bicycling Association.

In their letter that accompanied the check, the foundation said: “The Board is pleased to support the development of trails in Indiana that can provide multiple recreational opportunities and preserve these areas for the present and future generations.”

“The Friends board is grateful to the CIBA foundation for its support of the Pumpkinvine,” said John Yoder, Friends president. “Although the trail has received over \$3 million in federal funds for development, the Friends have received none of those federal dollars. Yet we have many costs like fencing that are part of making the corridor ready for us to donate to the local park departments.”
